
Summary of Summer Topics/Lessons


Isaac also expanded the classic "cross and chasm" illustration that is widely used in Christian circles today. While this drawing may be an alright explanation for brand-new



Deconstructionism

One of the break-rooms at a Christian Apologetics conference that I visited in 2022 was "Deconstructionism". What is Deconstructionism? By definition, it is the attempt to find and establish an ultimate meaning other than the text exactly as written. Have you ever heard the annoying saying "It is what it is"? For example, it was once a custom that a woman is to be courted by a man, and he is to pay her dowry. This doesn't apply to our current day anymore, but made sense in the past. The practice and statement made it clear what was

supposed to happen. A deconstructionist would put this sentence in cultural context and state the flaws and reasons why this practice was wrong or right.

Now, for things in the Bible, where everything is believed to be true; that is where deconstructionism becomes controversial. Finding hidden morals and cultural aspects in a piece of text that is from God doesn't work. God may have chosen the human authors, but it is God's Word. There should be no undertones of human opinion. The main recurrence in this is that some words, especially in older texts are so over-analyzed that the author's intention is taken away from the original verse. Is deconstructionism useful when piecing apart the various texts of the Bible? There are two sides of this argument.

On the Deconstructionist side, a main argument is that the Bible comes in different translations for different branches of Christianity. There are literal bible translations, dynamic translations and paraphrased translations (OliveTreeBlog, 2022). Depending on the type of translation a reader is using, they can draw different conclusions from the text. They might not be wrong, but they will be different from each other. You can compare catechisms across various Christian religions (for example, Catholic and Lutheran catechisms) these catechisms are inherently different from each other, but reference the

same text (the Bible). Individuals who read the Bible or certain texts within, are going to interpret it in different ways; be it culture, language, or personal beliefs. A personal belief I see a lot is that God will point out to you certain things in the Bible or a sermon that you need to hear. Generally, depending on that person's situation they will translate it in the context of their life. That interpretation being God's intention or not, the verse sticks out to them.

The Bible in Christianity is known as an absolute truth from God, which is why deconstructionism can be a contradiction. It is true people interpret things in different ways, but once you piece those different versions together and look at the big picture the verse has a single point and a single meaning. In the long run, the goal is a common understanding of the full picture that we do not have yet. This touches on Bible stories of why we have multiple languages (eg, the Tower of Babel), and some very deep rabbit holes on postmodernism (which is the belief that some parts of the Bible don't apply now that we have new developments) that could go on for hours.

In short, some deconstruction is good, especially if the passage is lengthy, or out of date to common words or practices today. However, the goal must stay true to finding the meaning of the verse instead of shying away from it. 1 Corinthians 3:19 "For the wisdom of this world is foolishness before God. For it is written: 'He is the one who catches the wise in their craftiness." The goal should be to find the intended meaning, not the moral or cultural motives behind the writing. The Bible is God's Word, not Man's.




Beacon of Hope Work Day

Yummy Recipes

Chicken Curry

Serves: 4

Ingredients:

1 large onion (chopped)3 garlic cloves (chopped)2-3 chicken breasts (cut into bite-sized pieces)

4 Tbsp. tomato paste 3 tsp. Curry powder

1 tsp. Cumin 1 tsp. Paprika ½ tsp. Cayenne pepper Salt and pepper to taste ¼ cup fresh cilantro (chopped) 1 can coconut milk

Instructions:

- 1. In a large pan, saute onions until translucent. In a separate pan, cook chicken.
- 2. Add spices and garlic. Once combined, add tomato paste.
- 3. When chicken is done, add it to the pan with onions.
- 4. Add ¼ cup water, stir thoroughly.
- 5. Cover and cook for 5-7 minutes on medium heat, stirring occasionally.
- 6. Add cilantro and stir.
- 7. Lower heat to simmer, and add coconut milk.
- 8. Simmer for a few minutes, then serve with rice or naan. **\(\sigma \)**



Homemade Alfredo Sauce

This is very easy to make and tastes great with pasta!

Ingredients: ½ tsp. Italian seasoning

½ cup unsalted butter (softened) ½ tsp. Salt

1½ cups heavy cream ¼ tsp. Black pepper

3 cloves of garlic (minced) 2 cups parmesan cheese (grated)

Instructions:

1. Melt butter in skillet

- 2. Add in garlic and heavy cream, simmer for about two minutes
- 3. Whisk in seasonings
- 4. Whisk in parmesan cheese until melted and combined.
- 5. Serve immediately over noodles with chicken!
